BIODIVERSITY LOSS: WHY SHOULD WE CARE?

Biodiversity refers to the rich variety of life on Earth. More than just about counting the species of plants, animals and micro-organisms, biological diversity is the resource upon which we and our future generations depend.

IMPACT OF CLIMATE CHANGE ON BIODIVERSITY

According to Harvard
Medical School's Center
for Health and the Global
Environment, climate
change alone is expected
to threaten with extinction
25 per cent or more of all



species on land by 2050. It is a threat because species have evolved to live within certain temperature ranges, and when a species cannot adapt to the new temperature ranges or loses its food supply, its survival

Species in the oceans and fresh water are also at risk from climate change, especially those that live in ecosystems like coral reefs that are highly sensitive to warming temperatures.



HOW DOES BIODIVERSITY LOSS AFFECT US?

Individuals must help to conserve biodiversity by consuming resources responsibly. Singapore is a globalised country that imports over 90 per cent of our food, so this gives us added accountability for the impact of our actions beyond our borders.

Seafood and palm oil, for instance, are cited as priority areas in Singapore with pressing sustainability needs.

Did you know that 75 per cent of popular seafood species in Singapore are unsustainable due to overfishing and destructive fishing methods?

The <u>Singapore Seafood Guide</u> is a good resource to help you make informed choices and choose sustainable seafood alternatives.

Unsustainable methods of producing palm oil have led to massive deforestation and harmful haze pollution. You can send a clear message to businesses by choosing sustainable palm oil.

ECO-FRIENDLY SPACES

4 COST-EFFECTIVE WAYS TO GO GREEN AT HOME

Making your home more eco-friendly may seem like a huge amount of work, not to mention expensive. But installing solar panels and temperature-regulating walls aren't the only ways to help your household adopt green practices.

Here are four easy and cost-effective tips to help you go green at home. Make it a habit to practise them for a greener home!



Tip I: Turn it off

Turn off the tap when you're not using it. Fix leaks immediately to prevent water wastage.

Turn off the lights when you leave the room. Turn off or unplug electrical appliances that you aren't using.

If you use an air conditioner, set the temperature at 25°C or above. You could save up to \$25 a year for every degree you raise!

Tip 2 : Keep it at 25°C



Allow hot food to cool before storing it in the refrigerator.

Tip 3 : Replace disposables

Switch from disposable to reusable products, including food and beverage containers, cups, plates, razors and shopping bags.

When ordering food, avoid receiving any unnecessary plastic utensils, straws and plastic packaging.

Tip 4: Choose sustainable pulp and paper products



Purchase pulp and paper products, such as printing paper, toilet rolls and facial tissue that are produced in a sustainable manner. Ecolabels such as SEC's Singapore Green Label can help you to make informed choices on products that have less undesirable effects on the environment.

RECYCLING FOOD SCRAPS - WITH WORMS!

Most people would cringe at the sight of worms, but not these students from NJC.

Using "worm farms" filled with real creepy crawlies, they are able to turn food waste into liquid fertiliser through a process called vermicomposting.

The students shared their knowledge with residents of nearby Watten Estate, by showing them how they can create their own worm factories.

For their students and teachers' hard work and dedication to the environment, National Junior College clinched the Outstanding Environmental Outreach Project award at SGA 2017!

Other winners of the award include PCF Sparkletots Preschool @ Pioneer Block 661B, Xinghua Primary School, Anderson Secondary School, Ngee Ann Polytechnic, Tanglin Trust School and Minds Woodlands Gardens School.
